DESTRUCTION AT HEADFORD.

Thady M'Hugh, of Headford, claimed £329 compensation for criminal injury to property.—Mr. Hosty, solr., appeared for the claimant, and Mr. L. E. O'Dea, solr., for the County Council.

Mr. Hosty stated that his client was a prosperous shopkeeper at Headford. On April 8, at five o'clock in the early morning, a crowd of people took possession of his premises and barricaded the windows with bedding and furniture. Shots were fired from the windows at the barracks. The fire was returned. Two mines were exploded outside the back gate.

Mrs. M'Hugh gave evidence of the damage done.

The case was held over in order to enable an inspection to be made of the place by an engineer on behalf of the defendants.

Mrs. Rutledge and Mrs. Flannery, neighbours of M'Hugh's, also made claims, and were awarded £85.
